Samaritan Introduces New Network of Off-Campus Care Centers

edical tests are important, but sometimes it's hard to fit everything in to a busy schedule. Samaritan Medical Center is making it easy to get the healthcare tests you need by bringing services right to you through a network of convenient off-campus care centers.

In January, Samaritan opened its newest off-campus care center in the Washington Summit on outer Washington Street in Watertown. Washington Summit Imaging and Lab Services provides the North Country community with another option for diagnostic imaging (X-Ray), ultrasound and laboratory blood drawing services.

Washington Summit Imaging and Lab Services is the second of four planned off-campus care centers. The first opened in Clayton in January 2009 and is located within the Samaritan Clayton Family Health Center. The third site opened in March 2010 in conjunction with the Samaritan Family Health Center in LeRay. The fourth center, which will co-exist at Watertown Urgent Care on Coffeen Street, is slated to open in Fall 2010.

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Samaritan's Adopted Platoon Returns Home

Samaritan has a long history of supporting Fort Drum Soldiers and their families with innovative and excellent healthcare services. In recent years, however, the Samaritan family of employees and volunteers has taken their support one step further by proudly "adopting" a platoon of deployed 10th Mountain Division Fort Drum soldiers.

C Company, 710th Brigade Support Battalion, otherwise known as "Charlie Med," provides combat health support to the 3rd Brigade Combat Team. During their most recent 12-month

deployment, Charlie Med was stationed in a remote mountain area of Afghanistan.

To help provide a little touch of home to their adopted Soldiers, the Samaritan staff sent out monthly care packages. "It was a small thing that we could do to say 'thank you' for serving on our behalf," explains John Smith, Director of Food Service, one of the organizers of the Samaritan efforts.

Donated items included books, magazines, comic books, newspapers, DVDs, snack foods, packaged coffee, baby wipes and hygiene items of all types. The monthly mailings to the platoon usually ranged between 15-25 boxes. "Our employees were incredibly supportive of this effort," adds Mr. Smith.

The Grateful Patient Program

Gracias. Merci. Danke. There are a lot of different ways to say "thank you," but sometimes words alone just aren't enough. That's why the Samaritan Foundation has recently introduced its Heart to Heart Grateful Patients/Family and Friends program: an initiative designed to help patients and their families thank the Samaritan doctor, nurse, technician, therapist, dietician, housekeeper, volunteer or other caregiver who made a difference in their visit or stay.

"It's common for patients and their families to feel gratitude for the care they receive," explains Jenna Cleaves, Executive Director of the Samaritan Foundation. "They often ask healthcare providers what they can do to show their appreciation. This program provides an opportunity for them to say 'thank you' in a lasting and meaningful way." According to Ms. Cleaves, donations received through the Heart to Heart program will support an area or program within Samaritan that is important to and impacts the greatest number of patients, employees and community members. Initial funds, for example, will go toward maintaining the planned Healing Garden that will be established on the Samaritan campus as construction and renovations are completed.

"Samaritan is proud of our dedicated and caring employees who truly live our values of Honesty, Empathy, Accountability, Respect and Trust. Our values spell H.E.A.R.T., and patient care is at the HEART of everything we do," says Ms. Cleaves. "When you contribute financially to the Heart to Heart program, you show your appreciation in a way that helps ensure that future patients will receive that same outstanding care."



According to the Platoon Sergeant, Sergeant First Class Patrick Neal, the donated items were always well-received by the troops. "The amount of items that was sent was pretty amazing. We all enjoyed opening the boxes. At one point the

Samaritan staff sent coloring books and crayons that we were able to hand out to some of the Afghanistan children who were among our patients. Many of them had never seen a coloring book before."

Samaritan also adopted Charlie Med during its previous deployment in 2006-2007, and SFC Neal hopes the connection will continue for future deployments. "It's been a nice relationship, and it helps us to know we have the support of people back home."

Dr. Rudd also believes that building this on-going physicianpatient relationship is a benefit that extends to the soldiers and families stationed at Fort Drum. "We're here and, as civilians, we're not going anywhere," he says. "This allows us to focus on providing continuity of care and stability for our patients."

Preventative care is also a big part of family medicine and something that Dr. Rudd is particularly passionate about. "In today's society, people don't usually think about preventative care. If you're sick, you go to the doctor. The doctor does something to fix you and then you don't go back to the doctor until you're sick again," he says.

While the LeRay Family Health Center does provide this type of acute care, Dr. Rudd also stresses the benefits of periodic health maintenance exams.

"This type of exam lets us identify when a patient has risk factors for certain diseases, talk about lifestyle modification, do screening tests, and catch and treat little problems before they become big problems. It can have a major impact on the patient's long-term health."

The Family Health Center in LeRay provides primary care for all ages, including: well child visits, immunizations, school sports physicals, well woman/gynecologic care, sports injury evaluation, cancer screenings, chronic illness care (such as asthma, high blood pressure, arthritis), and office procedures such as removal of skin lesions and ingrown nail treatment. Diagnostic x-ray and laboratory services are available on-site. The Center accepts all major insurance providers, including TriCare.





"Washington Summit and the other off-campus centers are a natural expansion of our hospital facilities. They allow us to make imaging and lab services more accessible and more convenient for our community," explains Michael Mandich, Radiology Services Supervisor. "Each site combines the quality of Samaritan Medical Center with the convenience of a smaller building with at-the-door parking."

"The tests performed at our off-campus sites are often crucial to a patient's diagnosis, treatment or follow-up," adds Mr. Mandich. "We're committed to efficient turnaround and providing the referring physician with quick and easy access to the test results."

All of the off-campus centers provide outpatient tests only, which allows them to make those patients the top priority. Samaritan Medical Center itself is still a source for outpatient imaging and lab testing, but also handles testing for inpatients and Emergency Department cases as well.

Accepting both walk-in patients and those with appointments, Samaritan's off-campus care centers are designed to get you in and out for medical testing as quickly as possible. After all, you have other things to do!



Samaritan Medical Center's New Parking Garage is Now Open for Patients & Visitors!

Entering and exiting the garage.

Vehicles enter and exit the garage from Woodruff Street, which is a small side street accessible from Washington Street or Sherman Street. A pedestrian crosswalk links the garage to the Emergency Department, temporary main hospital entrance, and Medical Office Building. Handicapped parking is available on the ground level of the garage.

How to get to Samaritan Medical Center from the garage.

Follow the signage and the pedestrian crosswalk. If you are going to the Emergency Department, please use that direct entrance. For all other hospital services, please use the temporary main entrance located between Samaritan Medical Center and the Medical Office Building. An information desk is located at this entrance to assist with directions and other information.

Free parking with ticket validation.

A parking ticket will be automatically issued to every car entering the garage. Take your ticket inside the hospital with you. Before returning to your car, have your ticket validated once you reach your destination in the hospital or Medical Office Building.
